THE CASE FOR CREATION

NYC Director Danny Conn Explains the importance of the conference's emphasis on creation science.

The world recently celebrated the 200th birth-day of Charles Darwin, the "father of evolution." His naturalistic "survival of the fittest" philosophy has permeated our culture. It is the worldview that dominates the natural and biological sciences and has even extended to social sciences (anthropology, economics, psychology, education, etc.) and humanities (philosophy, literature, art, religion, etc.).

The question of death and suffering was a factor in Charles Darwin's embrace of evolution. He could not comprehend how a loving God could allow suffering, so Darwin sought for an explanation of the origin of life without God. Ironically, this "survival of the fittest" mentality has attributed to untold suffering and death through the atrocities of those who adopted his views.

Though Darwin studied theology at Cambridge, he rejected the God of the Bible. Sadly, many today follow in his footsteps. Recent research indicates that even those who regularly attend Sunday School are likely to believe the Bible is not true and will eventually leave the church.

The foundation of faith must be durable to withstand the forces that seek to undermine and destroy it. The questions of life must be given valid answers that will endure scrutiny and withstand cross-examination.

The foundation for the Christian faith is the Word of God. The cornerstone of that Word is the book of Genesis. This first book of Scripture addresses some of the basic questions of life: "Why am I here?" "Where did I come from?" "Is there a God?" "Can I know Him?" If we permit this book to be riddled with holes of doubt and uncertainty, it will be insuf-

ficient as a foundation for a solid faith.

This year, the National Youth Conference is challenging young people to spend time in the study of God's Word to "seek the Lord and His strength." God's Word has the answers to the difficult questions of life.

To build confidence in the reliability of the Word, we are also offering several video seminars from Answers in Genesis. These videos counter the naturalistic evolutionary worldview with a biblical creation worldview. Care is taken to demonstrate the scientific reliability of the biblical record. The Bible is recognized as the only authoritative account of the history of the universe. Regardless of the theories and speculations, science must bow to the authority of Scripture.

Cincinnati offers a special opportunity for NYC participants to visit the Creation Museum. This state-of-the-art facility houses life-size models of Bible characters and events in realistic settings. Adam and Eve live in the Garden of Eden. Dinosaurs meander along the rivers of Eden. The serpent lurks in the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil. Noah and his sons build the ark.

The Creation Museum planetarium demonstrates how the heavens declare the glory of God. Dramatic videos are presented in the various theaters. Fossilized dinosaur eggs and skeleton castings can be explored in the dinosaur den. This is truly a unique museum.

The Evolution of **Reach That Guy** Student Outreach by Eric K. Thomsen, convention press officer

THE QUESTION CAME UP DURING A TRUTH and Peace staff meeting in August 1995. "How can we turn the collective focus of the National Youth Conference outward?"

The answer came in the form of a service and evangelism initiative called "Stormin' the Streets of Fort Worth." When the program was launched during the 1996 conference in Texas, more than 250 students and group leaders spent mornings landscaping, sorting donated clothing, and working with homeless children and adults at the Fort Worth Union Gospel Rescue Mission. Afternoons were spent at the Fort Worth Area Food Bank, where volunteers sorted more than four tons of donated food.

The program expanded quickly. In 1997, Spotlight Cincinnati produced 400 volunteers who shared their time with 11 agencies across the city. They landscaped, sorted donated clothing, worked with homeless children and adults, served as counselors at a summer day camp, and cleaned warehouses in record high temperatures. The excitement continued when 300 volunteers participated in "Teens Touching Tulsa [Oklahoma] With Love" in 1998.

Students and chaperones began to realize that the annual service opportunities were more than "just another activity" at the National Youth Conference. For the first time, youth groups began to



plan conference trips for the purpose of participating in outreach projects as well as services and competition.

As the NYC staff prepared for the 1999 conference in Atlanta, Georgia, it was clear that the growing campaign needed a permanent label. After weeks of brainstorming, Reach That Guy (RTG) became reality. The new name gave the event a boost, and after a widespread promotional campaign, more than 600 students participated. Four hundred plus took part in the effort a year later in Anaheim, California, as RTG reached the milestone of more than 1,500 volunteers in its first five years. It was only the beginning!


From 2001–2008, RTG continued to expand, with an average of 867 participants per year. Along the

way, volunteers—with their big smiles and brightly colored T-shirts—caught the attention of local media in several cities. The story found its way onto the evening news and the front page of more than one local paper.

More important, however, was the spiritual and emotional impact of the program. According to Dean Jones, former convention manager, "The addition and development of Reach That Guy to NYC not only affected thousands of people in the conference cities, but it also affected the numerous students and youth groups who suddenly had opportunity to experience serving others.

Today, cities continue to marvel at the work ethic and attitude of the student volunteers. One representative at The Salvation Army of Louisville (where volunteers donated more than 3,900 hours of labor in 2005, saving more than \$100,000) said, "These are the hardest workers we have ever had!" As Reach That Guy approaches its 15th year, the future is bright.

Danny Conn, current conference director, puts it in perspective. "Young people are socially conscious. They want to do something to help alleviate suffering in the world. RTG trains young people to focus these social efforts in ways that not only meet physical needs, but also open opportunities to meet spiritual needs."
