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Vertical What?

Director Brandon Roysden explains the recent name change.

During the past year, convention staffers have heard one question again and again. Why change the name of the National Youth Conference to Vertical Three? Director Brandon Roysden, shares the history and reasoning behind the name:

Our History. The roots of the National Youth Conference can be traced back to the Free Will Baptist League, which held its first nationwide conference in 1948, in Nashville, Tennessee. The League and WNAC sponsored a banquet and youth rally at the 1962 National Convention. The newly organized Church Training Service (CTS) expanded League Sword Drill and Declamation competition in 1965, adding Bible Bowl and Tic-Tac-Toe. The "National Youth Conference" is first mentioned in *Contact* magazine in conjunction with the 1968 convention in Oklahoma City. Based on this record, the conference will celebrate its 50th anniversary in 2018. The Music and Arts Festival began in 1972. The goal of all of these activities was to train young people in Christian service.

Our Name. Daniel 3 records the account of three young men who faced a trial of their faith. These young men were removed from their homes and the influence of their family and peers. In a hostile environment, they determined not to conform or to compromise. They chose to be faithful to God no matter the cost and trusted Him with their lives. These young men stood tall. **They were the Vertical Three.** **Our Mission.** Much has changed over the years. The conference has grown to be far more than just competition. But the purpose has not changed. The goal has always been and will continue to be ministry training. The programs and activities of Vertical Three—worship services, training seminars, Truth & Peace Student Leadership Conference, Youth Evangelistic Team, Serve the City, Buck-A-Week, and the CTS Ministry Expo—are all geared to help young people discover their talents, develop their leadership skills, and dedicate their hearts for faithful service to God.

- 1. The Bible is the Word of God.
- 2. No one is too young to be used by God.
- 3. Leadership training is valuable for every individual.
- 4. Standing for God sometimes means standing against culture.
- 5. We are to be involved in God's global mission.

Fresh Start in Louisville

Impact volunteers share their time to give a local congregation a fresh start.

Sunshine, mid-80s, and low humidity—perfect weather for Impact Louisville 2017! Fifty-five workers from ten churches and five states arrived at the convention a day early to gather at First Free Will Baptist Church, 15 minutes from downtown.

Volunteers bubbled with excitement as they shared Saturday with the small congregation that recently joined the church revitalization program through North American Ministries. And, the excitement showed in their efforts. In just under four hours, these hard workers pressure washed the brick, eaves, gutters, steeple, and sidewalks; trimmed the shrubs and refreshed the landscaping; cleaned church pews and walls in the sanctuary; removed years of storage from the attic; caulked around crown molding in the fellowship hall; and prepared the interior of church for painting.

In addition, volunteers grilled hot dogs, prepared food, made signs, set up tents, face-painted, and monitored inflatables for a neighborhood family fun day. Seventy-five visitors came to the carnival; the excitement on their faces was a great thing to see.

"I am just blown away," Pastor Rodney Brazil exclaimed as he watched the beehive of activity around the church. "Last week, I told my congregation to come Saturday to see how much this denomination loves our church. But this has gone beyond all expectations."

The enthusiasm from the workers equaled that of the pastor. Candi Cantrell, a volunteer from Illinois, said, "Impact is a great way of serving God, and you get to meet new people from differ-



ent places. It's also fun to see how much a big group can get done in one day. I always start out to be a blessing to others, but it always ends up being a blessing to me." Candi, husband Stephen, and sons Josiah and Piper have taken part in six Impact outreach events, and they plan to continue.

Impact director Ken Akers bragged on volunteers: "We had a good number, great participation, hard workers, a ton of enthusiasm, and everyone left happy. Once again, Impact has been a blessing, not only to a local church, but also to participants. I encourage everyone to sign up for Impact next year, and see if it doesn't make your entire convention experience better."

Pastor's wife Ashley Brazil could hardly speak through her emotion. "It was so amazing to see people come to work and support and love each other. This means a fresh start for our church, and we are so grateful."
